

# CCCNY Conference on Quality of Care in Oncology



## **Objectives**

This CME certified activity will bring 100 conference participants together with national leaders to address obstacles to improving cancer care quality. Decades of quality research have had a modest effect. Breakthroughs, not incremental change, are needed. We will address 6 key issues in depth, with brief introductions to each topic followed by interactive workshops. At the completion of the symposium, attendees should be able to challenge assumptions and reassess the cancer quality research agenda. The topics are:

- What do we mean when we say "quality of care"? Quality has several definitions: delivering effective care, reducing practice variation, preventing errors, more patient-centered care, economic efficiency and eliminating disparities. Do they conflict? Which matter most?
- How should we measure quality? We measure quality to evaluate and improve it, but multiple measures exist: guideline compliance, outcomes, patient satisfaction and administrative measures. Which is best for which problems?
- How do we get quality research from bench to bedside? Why hasn't research affected clinical care more? Is the problem design, dissemination or clinical value? Do researchers ask clinically important questions?
- Can we use patient-reported outcomes (PROs) for patient-centered care? PRO tools assess patients efficiently and accurately. Why don't providers use them to treat patients even pain scores?
- How can we use health information technology (IT) to improve quality? The electronic medical record (EMR) promised big but delivered small, except for electronic prescribing. We have learned that EMR can help and hurt. How do we get the most from our HIT/EMR investment?
- Our quality research portfolio: Whither the NIH, the NCI, ARHQ and PCORI? How do we encourage and fund the transformative research we need? Increases in Federal research funding, such as the past doubling of NIH funding, do not always produce proportionate novel, influential research. PCORI provides a precious opportunity to transform quality research. What must we do to get our money's worth from it and other sources? What is the optimal research portfolio? Should peer review itself be on the table?
